25 years an Ulyssian - Pam Gray

Neville joined the Ulysses Club a couple of years before me in 1991 and came home after a meeting at the Earl of Leicester Hotel and said 'you ought to join'. My quick retort was 'I am not going to any blokes meeting' and he said 'there are lady riders and partners of riders who attend. When I started to attend rides and weekends away, I started to believe him.



Back in the early 90's, the Club was growing at a rapid rate and the Adelaide Branch had to find a bigger venue, then moved to the Terminus Club where I went to my first

meeting. There were approximately 150 people, about 15% women. Neville in his inimitable style decided to buy me a membership and I should be happy as it was gift and I would be doing what he enjoys.

At this point, it may be of interest to know that my first birthday gift from Neville was a helmet. I quickly learnt in the social hierarchy of his life that No.1 bikes, No.2 Ulysses and No.3 was me. Having ridden pillion for a while he announced one day that I was up for the cost of a new back tyre. 'Why is that so' I replied'. His answer was 'you sit on the back tyre'.

While at the Terminus Club, we both worked in Merchandising and back then, sales were very brisk at the monthly meetings. I guess this was due to the fact that you couldn't buy on-line.

I used to enjoy the weekends away which there were many and by attending I have probably done things I may never have done otherwise. For example the Broken Hill Mine tour, Smelters tour in Port Pirie, tour of the Port Augusta Power Station, Blast Furnace tour at Whyalla, Leigh Creek Mine tour and boat tour on Port Lincoln Harbour, chartered by the then Mayor. Also the Glenelg River Cruise at Nelson and a memorable stay in Parachilna due to a dust storm. Who would not forget the tour of the Golden North Factory at Laura with the free Giant Twins.

I also enjoyed the breakfast runs because you would be home by late morning and you could make other plans for the rest of the day. Memorable breakfast runs were Balaklava, Cambrai, Williamstown, Two Wells, Mannum and one to the Owen Hotel where 96 members showed up to completely overwhelm the staff.

The biggest Sunday ride I attended was to the Port Broughton Hotel where there were 120 bikes in a huge convoy. Neville started an Annual Rellies Ride, one which attracted 180 members to Victor Harbor with full Club catering.

I have attended 20 AGM Events, 10 of them on the bike, some being more memorable than others. On our trip home from Bunbury in 1998, we endured 3 days of 40+ degrees across the Nullarbor. One memorable AGM highlight was the 2002 Event in Mount Gambier where on the Sunday we participated in a huge ride from the Mount to Portland Victoria – the community support was amazing! The very best Saturday night dinner was at Sea World in 2001 while at the Gold Coast AGM.

Neville served on Natcom for 10 years and I got to know the intricate workings of the Club and attended many interstate venues (at my own expense of course.) The wives were the caterers.

The Adelaide Branch meeting venue was forced to again move on in the late 90's and we were accommodated at the West Adelaide Football Club for many years where we regularly saw up to 350 attend. The inaugural meeting of the Torrens Valley Branch was held at the Somerset Hotel with 250+ members attending.

Whist doing a "Winter" check-over on our GL1800 last weekend, I was reminded of a possible catastrophic event that could easily be noted as a "near miss". My beloved wife Cathy and I were returning from the Wodonga Rally 2015 with my brother in-law Dave and his lovely wife Robyn. The trip there and the event itself was great, we have all good memories from it. Returning however, threw a little "curve-ball" at the Mallee Hwy/Murray Valley Hwy turnoff near Piangil, almost bang-on half way back to Willaston.

We had pulled up for a short stop to have a stretch and a bite to eat, then we were off again. As we sauntered off at a leisurely pace my blessed Wing felt strange at low speed. It felt like small, slow wobbles. THAT DOESN'T FEEL RIGHT!! I thought to myself. I slowed to walking pace and slowly went up through the gears again, twice more. Mmmm.... such a strange sensation!! I couldn't pin-point what or where it was coming from but each time I reached 40kph-ish everything smoothed out, returning to the "silky smooth" ride that only the "King" of Touring bikes can provide, putting the strangeness-ness down to the minor undulations in the road.

On we went enjoying the scenery, open road freedom and the joyousness that only Motorbikes could deliver. 200km later as we slowed, coming into Murrayville, to my intrigue there again came this strange wobble at slow speed. This was to be another short rest break so whilst the others found shade, I once again put my mechanical know-how to the test. The front wheel seemed to give the most indication of "wobble" so where better to start my checks. Up on the centre stand we go and an inspection revealed nothing. Ship-shape. Good tread, no stones, splits or anything untoward to show me. Ok, lets have a squiz at the rear. Nothing as I rotate the rear slowly.

HOME please.....so after spending 4hrs at the Pinnaroo Roadhouse a flat-top arrived and again the representative secured with care our precious Tourer and trailer.

We arrived home safely but tired. We off-loaded the bike and were glad to be home, albeit in the wee hours of the morning. RAA could not have provided a better service and we were sure to let them know. The moral to my little story is "If it doesn't feel right.....it probably ain't". Definitely a testament to Bridgestone's 404. Over 200km with a delaminating tread.....Sheesh!!! Stay up-right my friends.

Nothing Says "Old Dude" Like Getting a Motorcycle Author - Frank T. McAndrew Ph.D.

Summer is upon us once again, the windows of my house are open, and I am spending more time sitting on my front porch. One of the annual rites of passage associated with this mostly welcome reconnection with the outof-doors is re-acclimating myself to the sound of motorcycles thundering up and down the streets of my small city.

There must have been a time when motorcycles conjured up all of the usual associations for me: the romance of the open road, freedom, rebelliousness & coolness, manliness, adventure, and sexiness. In fact, I rode bikes a bit when I was young because my brother owned one, as did several of my grad school friends. Now, I just find them to be really irritating. I must be getting old.

I put my fingers in my ears and curse the idiots who are disturbing the peace as I fantasize about exactly how I will bushwhack the next one who dares to come down my street. This all got me to wondering who these people are.

Quick, focus your mind's eye and tell me what pops into your head as you think about the images you have of motorcycle riders from the movies. I'll bet you see sexy, tough, no-nonsense guys like we all want to be but only me and a few other guys actually are. Steve McQueen jumping the fence as he runs from the Nazis in The Great Escape; Marlon Brando winning over the girl in The Wild One; Peter O'Toole speeding to his death in Lawrence of Arabia; Sly Stallone and Henry Winkler being so cool in Lords of the Flatbush, and everyone being so cool in Easy Rider. The list could go on from there.

Now, poke out your mind's eye as you contemplate the reality. Have you actually looked at these guys? And I do mean guys because almost all of them are men. Old men. Old fat men. Old fat white men. Old fat bald white men with pony tails flapping in the breeze like plastic grocery bags in a dead tree. I am not the first one to notice this, of course. Bill Saporito, in an article in Time Magazine in June of 2014, wrote "It's bike night at the Harley-Davidson Museum near downtown Milwaukee . . . bike night in Milwaukee sure looks like Old White Guy's Night."

People used to avoid biker bars out of fear of being beaten to death by hot-tempered young toughs; they now avoid them out of fear of being bored to death by long-winded old geezers.

What is it with old dudes and motorcycles? Is it a last defiant statement that the real man hiding inside looks more like Steve McQueen in The Great Escape than Kevin James in Paul Blart: Mall Cop? Or is it the simple joy of having something powerful throbbing between your legs once again?

Undoubtedly, many middle-aged men will respond that it was not until later in life that they accumulated enough disposable income to be able to afford a motorcycle. Fair enough. But the interesting question is why, after years of struggle to reach a certain level of financial stability, does one choose to spend money on a motorcycle rather than on something else?

It is a marketing truism that people buy products to prop up self-images that are something of a stretch, and that we use consumer goods to project to the world the kind of person we want to believe we are. This is as true for motorcycles as for anything else, and marketers are well aware of this. A 2010 market study by J. D. Power & Associates discovered that the average motorcyclist in the United States is a man who is about 50 years old, and Forbes Magazine confirms that the "sweet spot" for motorcycle buyers is the mid-40s to the early 50s. In fact, one of the leading suppliers of motorcycle parts is the aptly named Old Dude Vintage Parts & Service.

The problem is especially acute for Harley Davidson, as the 109 year-old company has a customer base that is almost as old as it is. It may just be an urban legend that Harley handlebars are now designed to comfortably support a beer belly during a ride, but I sure do like the sound of it.

Do a "Google Image" search of motorcycle ads and you will find nothing but slick pictures of sexy young women and handsome, fit young men to fuel the fantasies of middle-aged men that they still inhabit that world (as if they ever really did).

Motorcycle manufacturers lure old buyers with a promise of a return to their youth. Other products, however, seize upon the motorcycle as a prop to get older men to buy stuff that they may actually need. One of my favourites was an ad that was on TV a couple of years ago for a product called "Male Guards," which is a protective undergarment for men suffering from incontinence. The ad featured a group of tough looking older men slowly sputtering down the main street of a small town on their "hogs." The male bystanders watched them with a mixture of respect and envy, as the local women were clearly smitten by the eye candy that had suddenly rolled into town. The riders winked at the ladies and acted like the masters of all that they beheld, since they could now afford the luxury of motoring slowly through town without any fear of peeing in their pants.

Yep, nothing captivates a young woman quite like a corpulent older man ensconced in leather while sporting a diaper.

Theme: "Cornish Miners"


Entertainment: Saturday and Sunday nights.

<u>Great Ocean Road Trip fro Mount Gambier</u> <u>4th - 8th November 2019</u>

This five day ride continues from the Meet and Greet event at Mount Gambier from 1st - 4th November. Anyone who wants to go on this ride and is NOT going to the Meet and Greet event at the Pine Country Caravan Park (Kilsby Road, left off Bay Road about 4 km south of Mount Gambier) will have to ride there, find accommodation overnight and be ready to ride off with us at 9am on Monday 4th November. Each morning thereafter we'll leave at 9am.

This ride is twisty in the Otway Ranges making if difficult for low-clearance cruisers, heavy bikes and mega tourers. Bikes under 500cc won't cope. The limit is 20 bikes to keep it manageable. Pillions are welcome.

The twisty sections are on days 1, 2 and 3. You will need to be fit and well with a well-maintained, comfortable bike with <u>good tyres</u> to do this **2000 km** ride safely. In Victoria cold, wet weather is possible at any time of the year so be prepared. On the last day you should reach home before the Friday afternoon traffic peak hours.

Make you own accommodation bookings. You can keep expenses down by sharing rooms with mates to save at the stopovers listed below. When booking, tell them you're with <u>the Ulysses group</u> so we can hopefully be near each other. <u>Ask for bed linen</u> when you are booking your accommodation if you don't want to cart a sleeping bag, pillow and blankets all the way (a real nuisance) Book early rather than later so you don't miss out.

Psychs on Bikes (PoB) is a national organisation of mental health professionals (volunteers) who ride motor bikes and conduct free health checks for men (but women often drop in) with the main thrust being prevention of suicide among rural males and to raise public awareness of the problem. The group have a few week end rides but have a big ride once a year. The next big ride is from Adelaide to Darwin August 3rd to 11th inclusive.

PoB is predominately an east coast organisation with the usual notion that South Australia is a bit boring. It is my intention to let these east coasters know that SA is good to ride, that South Aussies are a nice bunch and we enjoy our bikes too.

So can you help me do this? I invite Ulyssians to escort the PoBs from Adelaide to Port Augusta via the nice way and not the Port Wakefield road! So far the PoB group will be about 15 with 2 chase vehicles to cart all the clinic gear.

Roughly, the group will leave Adelaide Clinic, Gilberton, at 10am (PoB is sponsored by the Ramsay health group so they use the clinic for the briefing as a two-way courtesy) and travel up through the hills, Barossa, Clare etc. and arrive at Port Augusta to immediately run a clinic for one hour after which accommodation check in is carried out then we can all enjoy a meal and a jug of your favourite beverage.

Ulyssians may wish to come half way to Port Augusta to make it a day trip or come all the way to Port Augusta for an overnighter and get a free health check (no bending over required) and enjoy the company of likeminded riders over a pub or café meal.


Because PoB try to arrange media coverage to raise the awareness of rural suicide issues, Ulysses could get a bit of positive spin off publicity.

Ride Requirements

- Ride Leader: brief riders, where ride is going, where the breaks are going to be and who is Tail-end Charlie (TEC). If the destination is not a well-known location, Ride Leader to supply all riders with a destination address and your phone number. If you are meeting up with other riders at other stops, re-brief ride so that everyone knows what is going on and who Tail-end Charlie is.
- 2. Corner Marshals to remain on corners until Tail-end Charlie arrives and flashes you; join just in front of TEC. Remember who you are following before you do your corner marshal duty, and when they go past Tail-end Charlie should be following them shortly. If they don't go past something is wrong. Wait on corner until someone arrives.
- 3. Tail-end Charlie (TEC) to wear fluro vest and flash lights at corner marshals. Slow down and let corner marshal join in front of you.
- 4. If there is a problem (break down or accident) Tail-end Charlie should assess situation and continue where possible as soon as they can.
- 5. If a rider has run out fuel leave them to their own devices. They should have started with a full tank of fuel, and they should know the destination if they were listening to the riders brief.
- 6. Riders responsibility. Start with a full tank of fuel. Keep your bike well maintained. Get to the start point before departure time and listen to ride brief from the ride leader.
- 7. Only Tail-end Charlie should wear fluro vest. If you wish to wear a fluro vest when riding you should stay just in front of Tail-end Charlie.
- 8. Only bikes, spiders or trikes to be Tail-end Charlie. If you wish to follow the ride in a car you should follow behind Tail-end Charlie.


