Teenage Odyssey (True Story)

Long, long ago when I was a teenager, motorbikes were being abandoned by the older generations who were eager to buy their first car, new or used, whether a VW, a mini, a Holden or other American make, or an English car, all of which were common then in the pre-Japanese era. They cast off their bikes.

It was a wonderful time for teenage lads with a few pounds in their bank accounts. To secure a sale, car dealers would reluctantly take motorbikes as trade-ins and then get rid of them any way they could. An eager lad with a few quid was a good avenue for them to move unprofitable two-wheel stock. Lovely!!

There were lots of motorbike shops back then, but their prices were way above those of private sellers or car-yards. By the time I was eighteen, I had had several bikes which I sold in turn to mates who were starting out. Those were heady days.

One time a friend asked me to look at a tired C11 250 BSA. It was a 1948 rigid-frame model, very oily, and oilier than most English bikes which were always oil-leakers. I didn't recommend it, but Charlie with stars in his eyes was always going to buy the tired heap anyway, proving that love is blind.

Once Charlie was familiar with his blue and oily black BSA, three of us decided to do a bit of rabbiting in the Coorong – this was long before the area was declared a sanctuary. Charlie had rellos in Millicent who ran a bakery. He arranged for us to stay there so we could do day rides through the South-East, a big Odyssey for young lads starting out on ancient machines.

Charlie tried to clean up his mobile-wreck and tied on his gear. Tony had a much better bike – his family was well-heeled and he had a nice red 1955 B31 BSA 350 with swinging arm suspension and a double seat that was handy for packing gear. I had an army-green WLA Harley which I'd bought at an army disposals



auction at Finsbury. It was a good workhorse and it was reliable, yes, you read right, it was reliable. It had a large wireless rack on the back which was good for luggage or sometimes two pillions, and it had the original leather panniers so I was well set-up for carting stuff.

We set off up the Princes Highway (long before the freeway existed) and it was soon apparent that Charlie's bike was going to be the anchor. Tony and I could have got to Crafers at a fair clip, but poor old Charlie's bike was slow and working very hard uphill. Whenever we stopped, smoke would rise off his very hot, oily single cylinder with more oil steadily weeping onto it, keeping up the smoke supply.

Young and impatient as we were, we tolerated poor Charlie's tardiness for a couple of hours, but when we were heading towards Meningie, 33 miles per hour was as much as Charlie could muster into a strong headwind. The day was slipping away and it was going to be a long time till we reached our destination. Something had to be done.

We stopped to look at Charlie's bike to see if we could get a bit more oomph from it. I had a look at the points and was shocked at what I saw. They were crusty with white oxide and the gap was at least double what it should have been. I wondered how it had worked at all. I had a points file – you always had to carry one of those – and I set to work to grind through the offending white crust. I didn't have a feeler gauge to test the points gap so I estimated it by eye. I was used to setting points on old bikes.

We took off and Charlie was over the moon. Not surprisingly his bike got moving now that he had a decent spark. He later told us that he read as much as 48 m.p.h on his Smith's speedo, but he couldn't quite make 50. Tony's 350 and my Walla could both do that with ease, but we were just happy to be able to go at a reasonable pace. Later, Charlie told me I was a mechanical wizard, but I said to him there was a lot more to being a wizard than re-setting points, and I was definitely no wizard.

We didn't get to Millicent that day. Instead we camped in a ruin somewhere near Salt Creek. Rabbits were plentiful and we shot some and Charlie, who was a good cook, set about preparing them while Tony and I went for firewood. The meal was good, and next morning we repeated it after more rifle practice. We also had fun chasing a fox across a saltpan on my Harley. Tony on the back was trying to shoot the fox while I swerved and skidded around trying to keep track of it before it disappeared into the mallee. Fox 1- us 0. 250kg Wallas are not the most agile of bikes. Later we rode on to Millicent where we stayed several days and enjoyed the meals and goodies Charlie's rellos gave us.

During the day, we'd ride off around the South-East to Mt Gambier, Robe, Beachport and Naracoorte. Charlie went pillion on Tony's comfortable 350 so we wouldn't be slowed by his smoky wreck. For a cheap lunch we used to have a cold pasty each and we'd share a bottle of beer. It took a long time to digest so we had the sensation of a full stomach and it was cheap, but the nutritional aspect wasn't too flash and we were glad to get back to Millicent for a proper dinner each night.

After a few days we left for home. We decided to stop over at the same ruin and have more rabbits for dinner. Charlie wasn't so sure. His rellos had asked him to stay on, so he bid us farewell and rode back to Millicent to stay longer with them. Tony and I weren't sorry to have his old anchor disappear, but we'd forgotten one thing – Charlie was the cook. After we'd shot some rabbits we looked at each other and each hoped the other would be able to cook them. Neither of us had a clue. We'd left that up to Charlie and hadn't taken any real interest in proceedings. This was to be no "My Kitchen Rules".

I knew he'd barbecued the rabbits somehow, but I didn't know what was required. I decided it would be safer to cut them up and boil them in a billy. I hate cooking and this experience only confirmed my incompetence. It took a couple of shifts to get them done. We ate them, they were rubbery, tasteless and apart from filling our stomachs, most unsatisfying. A bottle of not too cold beer was the only extra for the meal. You might call it a recipe for disaster.

We settled down for the night in the old ruin. About three a.m. I heard a ghostly groaning and got up to see what was making the eerie sounds. In the darkness I could just make out the shape of Tony leaning out what had been a window in his room, and occasionally chundering with horrible noise accompaniment. Eventually when he'd emptied the "meal-from-hell" he lay exhausted on his sleeping bag, groaning in pain until the sunrise heralded another day. Neither of us was interested in breakfasting on rabbits. We had nothing else. Hunger was the preferred option. Quickly I packed for both of us. Tony, who'd made ghostly sounds during the night, now looked as pale as a ghost.

I kick-started Tony's bike for him and he somehow mounted it and rode home in a state of exhaustion. I was worried about his fitness to ride. I also had stomach pains but was in nothing like Tony's condition. We rode and rode and rode. Apart from a stop for petrol we went straight to his place at Edwardstown where he got off and staggered into his house without unpacking his bike. I rode home just four miles away, feeling lousy and glad to finish this Odyssey.

A few weeks later Tony was lost to biking, his family bought him a car – sad stuff. Charlie persevered for a while but also went to four wheels. I was the only one who remained with motorbike-itis, a happy affliction for life for me. This was just the start of my long motorcycle journey. Tony possibly remembers the ride with the awful "rabbit meals" - Charlie probably recalls his love affair with the gutless, oily, smelly, smoky, rough-riding, rigid-framed BSA 250 that predictably went all wrong.

The next night it was a different guy's turn. In the morning, same thing, hair all standing up, eyes all bloodshot.


They said, "Man, what happened to you? You look awful! He said, 'Man, that Mick shakes the roof with his snoring. I watched him all night."


The third night was Bill's turn. He was a tanned, older biker, a man's man.. The next morning he came to breakfast bright-eyed and bushy-tailed.

Depart at 10.00am from the Tea Tree Gully Hotel North East Road at the corner of Haines Road, Tea Tree Gully. Meet in the car park behind the hotel (you can't see the car park from the road).

Rides are abandoned if the forecast temperature is 37°C or more, or if there is a storm or heavy continuous rain around the time of departure making riding hazardous.

Ride Requirements

- 1. Ride Leader: brief riders, where ride is going, where the breaks are going to be and who is Tail-end Charlie (TEC). If the destination is not a well-known location, Ride Leader to supply all riders with a destination address and your phone number. If you are meeting up with other riders at other stops, re-brief ride so that everyone knows what is going on and who Tail-end Charlie is.
- 2. Corner Marshals to remain on corners until Tail-end Charlie arrives and flashes you; join just in front of TEC. Remember who you are following before you do your corner marshal duty, and when they go past Tail-end Charlie should be following them shortly. If they don't go past something is wrong. Wait on corner until someone arrives.
- 3. Tail-end Charlie (TEC) to wear fluro vest and flash lights at corner marshals. Slow down and let corner marshal join in front of you.
- 4. If there is a problem (break down or accident) Tail-end Charlie should assess situation and continue where possible as soon as they can.
- 5. If a rider has run out fuel leave them to their own devices. They should have started with a full tank of fuel, and they should know the destination if they were listening to the riders brief.
- 6. Riders responsibility. Start with a full tank of fuel. Keep your bike well maintained. Get to the start point before departure time and listen to ride brief from the ride leader.
- 7. Only Tail-end Charlie should wear fluro vest. If you wish to wear a fluro vest when riding you should stay just in front of Tail-end Charlie.
- 8. Only bikes, spiders or trikes to be Tail-end Charlie. If you wish to follow the ride in a car you should follow behind Tail-end Charlie.


